Workshop: Ethics in Research

Kamila Pacovska, Centre for Ethics, Faculty of Philosophy, University of Pardubice

Research and its connection to contemporary research practices

- 1) debate about the main aim of research and science: discovery of truth
- 2) evaluation of researchers' work on the basis of publications and grant projects

The session aims at discussing the basic general questions concerning research and its connection to contemporary research practices. We start first by considering the main aim of research and science broadly conceived: discovery of truth. We then go on considering the ways in which discovery of truth is institutionalized in contemporary society at universities and research institutions and the ways in which paid researcher's work is evaluated. Such evaluation recently reduced to two items that will be discussed in the second part of the session: publications and grant projects. Important part of the discovery of truth is to make it public, that is, available to everyone who can learn from it and build on it, but also critically assess it. We will consider the role of publications in the assessment of research quality and mechanisms employed for that aim (peer review, citation indexes) – are we going to “publish or perish”? The emphasis on fair competition applied by research journals has been recently adopted for distributing research funding: grant competitions should ensure only the best research is conducted. We will discuss the pros and cons of this managerial system and consider its threats to independent research.

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
